Class 5 (c.1289- c.1290)

Issued under John of Northwold 1279-1301 (Abbot) and (Richard de Lothbury (Moneyer) 3rd Nov 1287 - c16th May 1297)

Characteristics of class 5b

Class 5 saw the introduction of coins with a larger flan and lettering and is split into two sub-classes, 5a and 5b. Only class 5b coins are recorded from Bury, with each obverse having two reverses.

The widely spread crown of this class has a well proportioned low central fleur-de-lis and spearhead ornaments (jewels). Two different bust sizes appear, one thin and short with a more pointed chin (die A); and a much larger more prominent bust with a square jaw (dies B & C). Two distinctive styles of hair appear, one long and bushy associated with die A and the other much shorter hair associated with dies B & C. In both instances the hair has three curls each side with the central curl being much the thicker. The collars are realistic tunic tops having curved sides and ends, and all have a pellet in the centre of the breast. One of the most diagnostic features of this class are the large almond shaped eyes. The legends have large distinctive abbreviation marks. The majority of the lettering has vertical uprights; the open letter "E" seen in earlier classes remains. As in earlier issues the letter "S" is egg waisted, albeit not quite so prominent. Initial cross potent.

All the obverse readings are EDWR`ANGL`DNS hYB

Two different reverses are seen VIL / LAS / EDM / VDI (dies A & C); & VIL / LAS / EDM / VNDI (die B)

Even though the flans are much larger the coin weighs much the same as earlier issues at approx. 1.34g
