A recently discovered Westphalian imitation of a Bury St. Edmunds class 5 Short Cross coin

¹These coins are believed to have been stuck in Lippe (north of the Rive Rhine in Westphalia) where they circulated with the occasional one finding its way to England.

The obverse on this coin die links with a London imitation of the moneyer ILGAR (Stewartby 115). These coins may not be contemporaneous with the English class 5. Lord Stewartby suggests a possible minting date ranging from 1205 to 1220. Currently these dies are only recorded from one whole coin and one cut half. A notable feature is the pellet centred letter "C" in "hENRICVS"

These coins are a reasonable copy of a coin from this period. Letter styles are probably what is most easily picked up as a difference when comparing it with an English coin.
